

Expenditure of PE and Sport Premium Grant at Spinfield School 2020/21

Introduction

The primary PE and sport premium 2020 to 2021 (“the premium”) will be paid by the Secretary of State for Education (“Secretary of State”) to the local authority (“authority”). The authority will then distribute the premium to maintained schools in its area as stated in Section 14 of the Education Act 2002. In accordance with Section 16 of that Act, the Secretary of State lays down the following terms and conditions on which financial assistance is given in relation to the premium payable for the academic year 2020 to 2021.

Funding for the PE and sport premium

Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in years 1 to 6.

The premium for the 2020 to 2021 academic year is paid in 2 instalments from the Secretary of State to the authority as follows:

- 7/12 (£10,406) of the sport premium funding allocation on 31 October 2020
- 5/12 (£7,434) of the sport premium funding allocation on 30 April 2021

Basis of allocation Allocations for the academic year 2020 to 2021 are calculated using the number of pupils in years 1 to 6, as recorded in the January 2020 census, as follows:

Schools with 16 or fewer eligible pupils receive £1,000 per pupil.

Schools with 17 or more eligible pupils receive £16,000 and an additional payment of £10 per pupil.

Where a schools’ pupils are not recorded by year group, pupils aged 5 to 10 are deemed eligible.

Subsequently, Spinfield School will receive £17,840 in instalments dated above

The premium must be made available by the authority to the school irrespective of the existence of any deficit relating to the expenditure of the school’s budget share. The premium is not part of schools’ budget shares and is not part of the individual schools budget. It is not to be counted for the purpose of calculating the minimum funding guarantee.

Purpose of funding:

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Vision:

All pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

Objective:

To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. We would expect indicators of such improvement to include:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport

Accountability:

From September 2013, schools will be held to account over how they spend their additional, ring-fenced funding. Ofsted will strengthen the coverage of PE and sport within the 'Inspectors' handbook' and supporting guidance so that both schools and inspectors know how sport and PE will be assessed in future as part of the school's overall provision.

One year on, Ofsted will carry out a survey reporting on the first year's expenditure of additional funding and its impact. Schools will also be required to include details of their provision of PE and sport on their website, alongside details of their broader curriculum, so that parents can compare sports provision between schools, both within and beyond the school day.

How Spinfield will use the Sport premium money in 2020/2021 to meet DfE objectives?

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
 - Continued use of the "Mile a Day" program to encourage daily running
 - Procurement of new playground equipment for each class to ensure socially distanced breaktimes
 - Procurement of PE equipment to support socially distanced PE
2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
 - TLR includes cover PE Coordinator in order to organise whole school initiatives such as X Games, Borlase sport link opportunities, update PE board for children and

organise house sport competitions such as football and athletics as well as whole school sporting experiences such around the Olympics 2021

3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport

- £8,000 will be spent on Adam Davis (AJD SPORT) Football coaching to ensure that all pupils in KS1 and KS2 are given professional sports coaching. This is also to enable class teachers to observe outstanding PE teaching practice. Further coaching now given to U10 and U11 football teams as well as multi-skills for EYFS and before-school clubs
- Borlase-led hockey coaching for Years 5 and 6
- Borlase-led coaching in new sports during Spring term 2021 for Years 3 and 4
- Annual subscription to The PE Hub online Scheme of Work
- Teacher training towards swimming qualification
- Curriculum lead CPD in Dance
- Gold Membership of the Youth Sport Trust with access to resources, CPD and coaching

4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils

- AJD Football tournaments for every year group, in order to increase participation, for both boys and girls, in team sporting fixtures across school. Opportunity will be widened further to include A and B teams in each tournament.
- X Games participation, as mentioned above.
- Whole school Olympics 2021 Experience Week
- Teacher cover provided to allow P.E. coordinator to accompany children to sporting fixtures
- Children in Year 1 to 6 to be given opportunity to attend School Games fixtures run by local School Games link schools.
- Olympics Experience lessons for KS2 from The Tokyo Trail with plans to provide weekly external coaching
- EYFS multi-skills and before-school football club held by AJD Sports
- Children take part in "Mile a Day" initiative to become more fit and active and increase focus in class.

5. Increased participation in competitive sport

- £1000 TLR for PE Coordinator to monitor and record the participation of school-run clubs and to effectively use the School Games mark to correctly identify any weaknesses within PE at Spinfield and to regain Gold Award.

- Wider range of sports offered through extra-curricular activities with new sporting fixtures initiated with local schools, including Touch Rugby and Hockey fixtures and entering U11 Girls football leagues.
